

- 1. You can bring your own lunch or buy one here.
- 2. All Grades:
 - a.6th-Today, your teacher will walk your class down for lunch. You'll sit with your class to get to know each other, and to learn the expectations at lunch. Every day, wait for your table # to be called before you get in line for lunch.
 - b.7th & 8th- When you get to the cafeteria, find a space to sit or get in line for lunch.
- 3. Then, for the rest of the year, when you get to the cafeteria, you'll have a couple options:
 - a. If you brought a lunch and want to eat outside, go straight outside.
 - b. If you brought a lunch and want to eat inside, head into the cafeteria and sit at any of the tables.
 - c. If you are buying a lunch:
 - i.6th- Head into the cafeteria and sit at any of the tables. Wait to be dismissed to the line by table #.
 - ii.7th & 8th- head to one of the 2 lines and wait patiently.
- 4. We have recess every day as part of lunch. Get outside, get some Vitamin D, play, chat, unplug, and socialize. Lunch is a relaxing, fun period in the middle of your day.
- 5. Always clean up all of your trash
- 6. Return playground balls to the bin at the end of lunch.





How to write an email to a teacher



1 - Recipient

This is where you include the email address of the person you want to send a message to. Spelling is key -type the name of the person you are emailing and click their name. You can have more than one recipient.

3 - Purpose

This is the bulk of the email. Write a short greeting and give the reason for your email. Include any necessary details.

Example:

Hi, Mr. Jones. I am writing to let you know that I will not be in class on Wednesday because I have a doctor's appointment. Please let me know what I need to do so I can take care of it.

5 - Signature

Be sure to sign your email with your name.





Attendance

Students are expected to attend school every day school is in session. We miss you when you are absent, and you miss valuable learning experiences and time in the school community. Also, school attendance is required by the state of Missouri.

Doors open at 7:45am. Please aim to arrive at school as close to 7:45 as possible. When you get here, buy your breakfast (if applicable) in the first floor south hallway and head straight to your first class of the day. Put away your earbuds/AirPods and phone so you are ready for the day.

Sometimes, it is unavoidable to miss school. If you will be absent, your parent or guardian needs to let the main office secretary know. Just call the attendance line at 314-213-6180. You should email your teachers and communicate your absence, also. Remember to follow the guide above for emailing your teachers. When you miss school, it is your responsibility to complete any and all assignments you miss while out. If you miss several days, you may be assigned or choose to attend afterschool Power Hour to make up your assignments.

If a student misses 5+ days in a school year, a letter is sent home notifying parents of the attendance policies in Missouri. If a student continues to miss school, administrators, counselors, and potentially the City or County Juvenile Court, will step in and help.

Bottom line: we need you at school! We are not as good when you aren't here.


What's a strategy for getting to class on time?

Tardies

It's important for you to be in class on time. This eliminates interruptions to the class and values everyone's learning time. Punctuality is a good habit to build now and for the future.

If you are tardy to school or class five times in a quarter, your counselor or administrator will have a conversation with you to determine why you have been tardy. We'll loop in your parents or guardians and together we'll come up with a plan to get you to class on time. After that conversation, if you continue to be tardy, lunch detentions and after-school detentions will be assigned.

Missing Work

Each Thursday at 4:00pm, a missing assignment email will be sent out of Infinite Campus (IC) and will go home to your parent/guardian. Please be sure you are checking IC yourself on a regular basis to see that all of. your assignments are turned in. If you have submitted an assignment late through Schoology, it is good practice to email your teacher to let them know to look for it. Include the name of the assignment in your email.

Standards-Based Grades

Standards-based grading is a way to track your mastery of specific skills. Your goal is always a '3.'

Backpacks & School Supplies

Carrying your backpack is a great way to ensure you have all of your supplies for each of your classes at your fingertips. In case you need help deciding what to bring to school, there is a grade-level supply list available in the office. It is easy, though, to ask your teachers. They will help you with what you will need for their class.

Phones and AirPods

Did you know phones are **designed** to grab your attention? It is not your fault that you want to get on your phone so much -- the creators of smart phones and social media apps know how to get you interested, and they work really hard to keep you connected 24/7. Phones are an attention zapper and move us away from our purpose of ensuring that you are getting the best education possible while you are here. Additionally, phones often (not always!) have an isolating effect, and we want your time here spent with your friends and classmates and engaged in the things happening around you, rather than looking at a screen.

All of that is why we take phones seriously at Nipher -- Phones must be turned off, and in your backpack or pocket (waistband). We have a "bell-to-bell no cell" policy from 8:00am to 3:00pm. If you are using your phone at school: the first and second times per quarter you are warned by a teacher and the infractions are recorded. The third through fifth times, the teacher will email home and assign you a lunch detention. On the 6th+ infraction, you will be referred to the office.

AirPods and other bluetooth headphones give you an 'out' to engaging in your learning. When you have AirPods in, your classmates and teachers have to repeat themselves multiple times and they prevent you from getting everything you can out of your class time. So, AirPods and other bluetooth headphones need to go in your backpack or pocket throughout the day. AirPods are included in our cell phone policy. Bring corded headphones for your iPad or use a pair of ours.

Food and drinks in class

Hydration is key for your health and for your brain. Water is allowed and encouraged in classrooms, and there are water bottle fillers throughout the school. Other drinks like soda or sports drinks are allowed at lunch -- store them in your backpack until then.

We do not eat, drink, or pass out food in the hallways, and we don't eat snacks in class unless it is a designated snack time. This cuts down on messes that lead to pests like bugs and rodents and cuts down on unnecessary work for our custodians.

Dress Code

For many people, clothes are an expression of identity, creativity, or personality. We encourage you to wear what is comfortable for you to learn in.

You are part of a learning community at Nipher. To make sure we are taking care of the whole community, we have a few simple rules for dress code:

- No inappropriate messages: nothing about alcohol, drugs, profanity, violence or sexually inappropriate content. This keeps school safe for everyone.
- Hoodies and hats are awesome. Just remember that teachers may ask you to remove hoodies during class- especially if there is a lab or activity that requires it for safety purposes.
- Clothes need to cover undergarments.

Recess and lunch

Fresh air, sunshine, and physical activity are really good for all of us.

That's why we build in recess every day for every kid. Some things to remember to keep recess safe and fun for everyone in the community:

- 1.All sports are non-contact and inclusive. That means that we welcome and include anyone who wants to play, and there's no tackling, pushing, or hitting.
- 2. Take care of tables, and recess equipment.
- 3. Do not throw food at people, at the building, or into the grass. Food you do not want can go in the bowl in the cafeteria to be given to other people.
- 4. Throw away all trash and push in your chair before going to play.

If you don't follow these expectations that make recess fun and safe for everyone, you will be sent inside for recess and/or assigned lunch detention to do some reflecting and changing of your behavior before joining everyone again.

School Safety

We keep each other safe.

Here are a few things that we do to keep each other safe.

- 1. Never open an external door for anyone, even if you know them or think you do. Everyone needs to check-in in the main office, and there are signs on each doors letting people know that.
- 2. Never prop open an external door with a brick, rock, or stick. If you see a door propped, remove the item.
- 3. If you see or hear about someone being unsafe, let a trusted adult know right away.



When do afterschool activities begin?

After-school activities and intramurals

Nipher Middle School's Activity Program offers a variety of activities each semester to students of all grade levels. Activities take place after school at 3:00 p.m. on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays. Activities are available to all students after they pay their \$20 activity fee (this is a one-time fee that covers the entire school year). The activity fee is \$10 for students who qualify for free or reduced price meals.

Students MUST sign up for ALL activities electronically (you will receive an email with a Sign-Up-Genius each morning) before lunch is over on the day of the activity in order to stay and participate. Students are expected to report directly to the cafeteria at 3:00 p.m. (upon their dismissal from class). Students are to depart promptly from school grounds or wait at the bus loading area when the activity concludes and the bell rings close at 3:55 p.m. Each after-school activity will be announced during morning announcements at at least one day in advance, but you can also find a listing of after-school activities on the Nipher Middle School web site.

Rude, Mean, Bullying, Harassment

Compassion means that you are kind to others. If you cannot say something nice, it is the best policy to not say anything at all. Being mean, rude, bullying or harassing will not be tolerated during the school day and during after-school activities. If someone is mistreating you, please email or see your counselor or administrator. We want EVERYONE to feel safe and welcome here at Nipher.

Harassing, bullying, or intimidating people
Being verbally aggressive
Being insubordinate or refusing to follow directions
Misusing technology or internet network
